Career Summary

I met an Occupational Therapist (OT) while undertaking work experience in a school when I was 16. I was inspired by her passion to help people and after my A levels I worked as an OT assistant in a hospital to gain experience and further understanding of the OT role. I then went to University of Southampton to graduate as an OT. I did the course part time over 4 years and worked as a therapy assistant alongside my studies. Once qualified, I worked in a rotational post, rotating into different departments every 6 months. This was a great way of getting lots of different experience and working out which area I wanted to specialise in. After 2 years I got a more senior rotational post at Southampton General Hospital and then my current role which I have been doing for 4 years.
